MALICE

(MAL is) *n.* a desire or intention to harm others or see them suffer

Link: ALICE



"ALICE has MALICE towards door to door salesmen."

- The prisoner was not granted parole because his MALICE was still obvious.
- Our government is based on justice, with MALICE toward none.
- We could not believe that such a young girl could harbor such MALICE toward her neighbors.

MALODOR

(mal OH dor) *n.* a bad odor

Link: BAD ODOR




"Barnyard MALODOR"

MAMMOTH (MAM uth) *adj.*

MANIFEST

(MAN ih fest) *v.* to make clear or evident to the eye; obvious

MARITIME

(MARE ah time) *adj.* near the sea; concerned with navigation or commerce on the sea

Link: MERRY TIME







MOGUL

(MOH guhl) *n.* a very rich or powerful person; a magnate

Link: SEA GULL




"A SEA GULL MOGUL"

(mah RASS) *n.* anything that hinders, traps or overwhelms; low-lying, soggy ground

MOTTLE
