## REPROACH

(rih PROACH) *v./n.* to express disapproval of; an expression of disapproval

Link: COACH




"The COACH REPROACHED his players."

## REQUISITE

(REK kwuh zut) adj./n. essential; necessary

Link: WRECK SIT



"It's not **REQUISITE** to **SIT** on the **WRECK** until the police arrive."

- On the first day of class the teacher explained that doing our homework is not only important, it is REQUISITE.
- Successfully completing Latin I is REQUISITE to taking Latin II.
- One PREREQUISITE for admission to college is a high SAT score.

## RESPITE

(RES pit) n.

delay; postpone; a brief interval of rest

Link: **REST A BIT** 



"After pitching a double header, David took a **RESPITE** to **REST A BIT**."

- □ The class had worked so hard throughout the semester that the teacher gave them a **RESPITE** before their exam.

## **RHETORIC**

(RET or ik) n.

the art or study of using language effectively and persuasively; over-elaborate language

"A salesman's RENT-A-WRECK RHETORIC."



Link: LIFE




"The ocean is RIFE with LIFE."

## **SAGA**

(SAH gah) *n.* a long story, often telling the history of a family

Link: GAGA



"A GAGA SAGA"



"The SAGE reads each PAGE."


